Nightingale

Nightingales *Luscinia megarhynchos* are slightly larger than robins, with a robust broad-tail, with a rather plain brown appearance. They arrive in the park in early April and sing until late May and early June, after traveling over from sub-Saharan Africa. They begin to leave from July to September. They can be heard singing throughout the day, as well as at night with their famous song which is very recognisable and a great way to locate the bird. It is a very secretive bird which likes nothing better than hiding in the middle of an impenetrable Hawthorne bush or Bramble patch making them, generally, difficult to spot.

Time to walk:

Approximately 45 minutes

Distance: 2.5km (1.5 miles)



The Ocean Circular Walk takes you on a route around our main Ocean Lake giving you the opportunity to discover some of our parks wildlife. You will be able to learn about some of the wildlife you may see on your journey by reading the information plaques on each post.

How do I know where to go?

The map to the right shows you the route you will need to take, following each marker post. The start point is marked with a red dot and arrow pointing you in a anti clockwise direction. You can find the first marker post straight ahead of you on the right as you cross over the bridge from the car park.

What do I need to do?

Write the letter from each plaque in the circular box and write the name of each animal on the line next to it.

Where are the letters which make up the final word?

Each plaque has a large letter circled in the top right hand corner.

How far have I walked?

Every other marker post has a distance plaque on its side, telling you how far you have walked from the first post.
